SESSION DETAILS

10 AM — Accessing the Arts: a conversation between artists Alex Bulmer & Judith Snow

The inclusion philosophy of longtime disability advocate and artist **Judith Snow**, who lives with quadriplegia, fuels the thinking in the theatrical production *The Book of Judith*. Artist, performer and playwright, **Alex Bulmer**, was part of the original production and returns to Canada to reprise her role as the Director of *The Book of Judith* choir. Bulmer, who lost her sight later in life, has been living in England, where there is a thriving inclusive arts scene. Snow and Bulmer will pose a series of key questions to each other to spark a dialogue and launch the day's program. Sharing examples of their work, they will explore questions related to advocacy and the arts, what is disability art, opportunities and challenges for disabled artists in Canada versus the United Kingdom, and where we need to go from here.

11 AM — Artists' Experience

A group of disabled-identified artists from various disciplines shares strengths and challenges of working as an artist in Ontario. The artists will be invited to share with the group what they come up against in their practice and navigating the arts community. This session will aim to lead into creative brainstorming with all present on how to address these challenges and how to build upon the success stories.

Wolf Sounds was devised by combining movement with found, improvised, and written text to create a surreal physical theatre experience. It is a coming of age story about one man's search for love as he struggles to communicate, earn an injured soul's trust, and understand physical boundaries.
